CHAIR & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

As the Chair and the new Executive Director of the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta, we are proud to present our 2015-2016 Annual Report. Throughout the year, we continue to focus on growing the endowment funds, making responsible grants and building leadership capacity. Here are a few of the highlights:

- Although there were significant fluctuations in the market, our portfolio managed to exceed the benchmark by over 1.4% and provided a total annual return of 3.89%. Our annualized return over the past five years has been 9.97%.
- Grant distribution was a total of \$399,805.
- Our Vital Signs report, whose national theme was Sense of Belonging, is an annual community check-up in key areas that highlights the quality of life we enjoy as well as pressing issues that still need to be addressed. This important information guides our grant-making decisions, including Vital Impact and Vital People, as well as the work of our many agency partners.
- The Community Knowledge Centre grew from 26 agencies to 68 from all over southeast Alberta and activities during our Random Acts of Kindness Day in November exceeded all expectations.

This year, we thank the dedicated board members who retired – Eric Springman and Jeff Welling and extend a warm welcome to new board members Ajit Atwal, Sean Blewett, and Suzanne Curtin. We are also very grateful for the work of Trish Richard this past year and our amazing volunteers who participated as various committee members and who supported our many activities.

We are looking forward to our 25th anniversary in 2017! Under the leadership of our experienced and enthusiastic Executive Director and the oversight of a dedicated board who are extremely committed to their communities, the future of the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta is robust and promising.

We invite you to join us in our work moving forward. Giving to the Community Foundation is flexible, effective, and secure. As a Supervisor of McMan's Inn Between Youth Shelter, Brandie demonstrates a dedication to serving both the youth in McMan's care and youth in the community. She is always raising the bar when she provides an exceptional level of service, working hard to forge stronger relationships with funders and community partners. Brandie educates her staff on leading practices and seeks out evidence based research that will impact the level of care that is provided. Brandie is innovative, creative, and extremely resourceful. She applied for a \$25,000 Home Depot grant to renovate the Inn's Kitchen which led to the Inn Between being selected as Home Depot's Charity for their Orange Door campaign for the past two years. Brandie is passionate about the Inn Between, always looking for ways to make her work more efficient and more effective but her passion doesn't stop there. The staff at McMan appreciate Brandi's positive attitude, she goes the extra mile and really "walks the talk" when it comes to ensuring her programs are strength-based, youth-centered and effective. The Inn Between has met a real need in Medicine Hat for a wide range of youth's individual circumstances, which is largely due to Brandie's leadership. As a self-proclaimed "McMan Lifer", Brandie has recently taken on additional management responsibilities as part of her professional growth plan. The work that Brandi does positively impacts the lives of community members everyday. She is a vital asset to both McMan and the community of Medicine Hat.

Louisa is currently employed with Bridges Family Programs in the Children's Fetal Alcohol Services program since 2010, as a CFAS Clinic Coordinator/Consultant. In addition to being employed full time, she is working on her Masters of Counselling Degree. She is an exemplary employee and has a passion for ongoing learning and helping people. She is conscientious, reliable, forward thinking, a very hard worker and extremely knowledgeable in the field of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and the human services field. She is a team player and has for many years, facilitated a group of multidisciplinary professionals to coordinate the Regional FASD Diagnostic Clinic for children in Medicine Hat. This past year she developed and implemented the Regional FASD Diagnostic Clinic for Adults, delivering exceptional outcomes for adults with FASD. This role allowed Louisa to grow in her management skills. Louisa is a team player who is always willing to help, her sense of humour is contagious and her dedication to Bridges is remarkable.

ONE OF MANY IMPACTS!

The Duchess Mennonite Church Hockey Club, established in 2010, makes hockey possible for children in Duchess who would otherwise not get to play. The program has grown from 11 participants the first year to close to 60 in the past year.

For too many families in our community, enrolling their children in minor hockey is not possible due to insurmountable obstacles. The cost of registration, equipment and travel is huge. Many children are not able to compete physically at the regular minor hockey level. The time commitment is not realistic for many families, especially single parent families. Some children at age 4 or 5 are not interested in competitive hockey, but at age 10 or 11 would like to give it a try, but at this point are often too far behind in skills to be accepted into minor hockey. There are families in our community that adhere to religions that do not make allowances for sports on Sunday. The list goes on.

Because there are many equipment items that families do not own, or are unable to purchase, we established a Lending Library. Equipment is on loan to players for the season at no cost. This past year, many of our helmets were outdated and no longer meet CSA requirements. With the new evidence surrounding concussions, DMC Hockey Club wanted to use every measure to prevent head injuries. We were also in dire need of another set of goalie equipment.

Last spring, we were put in touch with CFSEA and the potential of applying for a Vital Impact Grant. Trish Richard was a huge help to us in making the application process straightforward and enjoyable. We felt so very fortunate to receive a Vital Impact grant of over \$4000. The club now owns 30 brand new helmets and a set of quality, used goalie equipment. The smiles on our kids' faces says it all! Thank you CFSEA!

VITAL IMPACT GRANTS

Project Connect (\$1,500)

Project Connect, now in its seventh year, is a one day outreach to those in our community who are facing economic and social challenges, providing a chance to connect with agencies and service providers who can assist them in meeting a variety of needs, both short term and longer term. The Project Connect network includes over 20 local agencies and organizations which provide support in areas of health care, housing, employment, addictions, tax preparation and education along with professionals who provide free services on the day (e.g. haircuts, medical foot care, photographs, flu shots) churches, college students, businesses and service clubs help provide on-site hospitality and give away items, including a free lunch, winter clothing plus many other personal and household items. Project Connect fosters a "cooperative and collaborative approach" to community issues including poverty, hunger, homelessness and unemployment.

Duchess Mennonite Church Hockey Club (\$4,150)

For too many families in the Duchess community, enrolling in minor hockey is not possible due to insurmountable obstacles. The cost of registration, equipment and travel is huge and many children are not able to physically compete at the minor hockey level. There are many other reasons for a child to miss out on a hockey experience but the DMC Hockey Club ensures all children in the community get a chance to play.

YMCA/Medicine Hat Early Childhood Coalition - Play Guides (\$3,875)

Play Guides is a community engagement project similar to the YMCA's Roving Gyms; however, Play Guides operates throughout the summer months and is offered at various parks and outdoor play spaces within the community. Play Guides provides families with children aged 0-6 the opportunity for unstructured play in a social setting, which helps them to develop social skills and gives parents the opportunity to interact with one another. Roving Gyms and Play Guides encourages families to build connections and relationships with each other that may not otherwise be created.

Fresh Start to School (\$10,000)


A one-day event (to serve all 3 School Districts, held at the end of August) where an invited group of parents and children can access a wide range of health, school administration, recreational and personal care services to help prepare for the upcoming school year. The focus of this event is on "wellness" and connecting children and families to partners in the community so they access resources, as well as pick up some necessities to ease the financial burden of the back to school season. This event also focuses on assuring families feel that it is a celebration, and not a designated event for "needy" individuals.

Medicine Hat & District Food Bank (\$15,000)

The Food Bank is continuing their specialized project that aims to make 10 low income families food secure within 1 year. The carefully selected families will receive equipment, resources and education to achieve improved food security. Families will be able to demonstrate greater knowledge about food safety, growth, preparation, preservation, hygiene in the kitchen, reading food labels, whole foods, meal planning, budgeting, and more. The next phase of the project will include involving a broader base of our clients in the community kitchens, gardening and canning classes.


Fort McMurray Disaster Relief (\$4,475)

The Board of the CFSEA recognizes the terrific difficulty facing the City of Fort McMurray and its residents who are trying to cope with the fire disaster in that community. To lend its support, the Foundation established a Special Fort McMurray Disaster Fund at its bank to collect funds from those wishing to help the City of Fort McMurray. Any funds collected will be sent to the regional municipality of Wood Buffalo or other qualified charities providing disaster relief in and around the city of Fort McMurray.




MARKET VALUE TOTAL ENDOWMENT FUNDS


TOTAL ENDOWMENT FUNDS 2016: \$10,652,958



2015/2016 **OPERATION COSTS = \$479,421**




