The original idea for the Community Foundation came from a local area rancher, Mr. John Ignatius, who had supported other Community Foundations and sought to have a local organization provide similar community benefits. John made the first endowed donation of \$25,000 and encouraged his many family, friends and colleagues to follow his example. The Medicine Hat Community Foundation was then founded in 1992 through an act of Legislature of the Province of Alberta. John passed away in January 2000 and, true to his word, left the vast majority of his estate to the Foundation. John's financial contribution was in excess of \$2.4 million but his biggest legacy was the original creation of the Foundation which will continue to support Southeastern Alberta forever. The CFSEA is a non-government, non-political and non-religious independent organization that operates under the guidance of a diverse group of community-minded volunteer Board of Directors.

DIRECTORS

As the Chair and Executive Director of the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta, we are proud to present the accomplishments from the 2016-2017 year of our donors, volunteers, staff, grant beneficiaries and community leaders. In this year of change and transition, all have given their time, treasures and talents to vitalize our communities across the region and move the needle on significant social issues. Here are a few of our highlights:

- Jarislowsky Fraser, our long time investment managers, achieved an annualized rate of return of 5.75% in 2016. As per our policy, we issued a Request for Proposals for firms to manage our Endowment Funds. After a lengthy process, the Board approved the selection of Leith Wheeler, a firm based in Vancouver with an office in Calgary. Leith Wheeler have considerable experience and a solid performance record in managing endowment funds for community foundations.
- At June 30, 2017 our total assets were \$12,038,072
- We kicked off our 25th anniversary in June with a special \$25,000 Community Catalyst Grant to THRIVE: Medicine Hat and Region Strategy to End Poverty & Increase Well-being.
- Our Vital Signs Report, Impact Grants and People, Random Acts of Kindness Day, and the Community Knowledge Network continue to be an integral part of our community leadership activities.
- Total distribution of funds was \$399,356, including Smart and Caring (\$200,268) and Designated (\$199,088). 71 agencies received funding this year.

This year, we thank the dedicated board members who retired: Ryan Dorton, Dennis Egert, Gerry Labas and Nora Way and extend a warm welcome to new board members: Robert Belau, Gregory Niwa, Cheryl Pocsik and Tracy Stroud.

The Board would also like to acknowledge Trish Richard for her dedication to CFSEA and wish her all the best in her future endeavors.

In addition to Chris Christie, who commenced February 1st as our Executive Director, we also welcome our new staff, Barbara Kenworthy (Finance Administrator), Lisa Kosolofski (Community Engagement Coordinator) and Niki Gray (Administration Coordinator). The energy and enthusiasm of this team is contagious and bodes well for the future of the CFSEA.

Our board has set the CFSEA's strategic direction for the next three years and have identified four main priorities with ambitious goals:

- Increase the Community Foundation's profile and visibility across Southeastern Alberta
- Using evidence-based practices, increase endowments and donor engagement
- Through knowledge and data, focus on sound and responsive grant making and strategic, forward-thinking community leadership
- Ensure effective and efficient governance, leadership and operations

We are honoured donors believe in our vision and choose to support our communities with gifts through the CFSEA. This year, those gifts totaled \$440,361. Funds disbursed carry out the wishes of donors, past and present and support a wide variety of charitable organizaitons and causes across our region. IN CELEBRATION OF OUR 25TH ANNIVERSARY, WE ANNOUNCED A SPECIAL \$25,000 COMMUNITY CATALYST GRANT RECIPIENT AT OUR FOUNDER'S DAY EVENT.

The successful applicant was "THRIVE", an initiative that is designed to end many areas of poverty in our region by 2030. Spearheaded by a group of individuals and organizations within Medicine Hat, THRIVE has 13 target areas they are addressing,

including leadership and systems change, income security, business innovation and many more. The CFSEA is proud to support this initiative! We look forward to learning how THRIVE moves the needle on these significant poverty issues.

LOOKING BACK

1996

The first grant was given out in 1996 to the City of Medicine Hat for the amount of \$2000 to help with the communities flood relief efforts.

2005

The Centennial Legacy Club was created, for donations made over \$500, to celebrate the province of Alberta turning 100.

2008

The Heritage Club is created to celebrate those who have gifted the Community Foundation in their future plans through their estate.

2013

Random Acts of Kindness Day was officially launched in November. Over \$250,000 was distributed to the community for flood relief efforts.

2002

The Foundation's 200th grant was issued to the Medicine Hat Public Library for \$675. Total assets reach \$3 million.

2007

Over 400 grants have been issued for more than \$2.2 million. The Foundations first Vital Signs was officially launched. The Centennial Legacy Monument is unveiled.

2012

Over \$3 million in grants has been awarded supporting over 159 different agencies. The first Youth in Philanthropy grant was disbursed.



GRANTS. GIFTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

We focus on connecting donors' philanthropic goals with charitable organizations to build long-term sustainability in all facets of the community. The Community Foundation operates as a 360 degree grant maker. We distribute funds to all areas including: human services, health, education, justice, environment, arts, culture, recreation and community development.

In awarding grants, we conduct a comprehensive procedure to determine the most crucial community needs from data and evidence-based practice. Grants are then awarded based on potential impact and fund availability. Within our Designated Endowment Fund (including Field of Interest, Donor Advised and Scholarship), donors direct the investment income to their specific charities or school divisions. This year, Community Foundations Canada (CFC) provided additional matching funds for projects that celebrated Canada's 150th birthday.
