
Our 2018/2019 Annual Report and Audited Financial Statements are now posted.

REMEMBERING HERITAGE CLUB MEMBER DR. VICTOR "TED" VALLI



The CFSEA would like to acknowledge the passing of one of our Heritage Club members, Dr. Victor "Ted" Valli. Ted was born in the Brooks, Alberta area and was a loving husband to Caroll, a proud father of three, grandfather and even great-grandfather.

As a veterinary pathologist and eventually Dean of CVM at the University of Illinois for 11 years, he was a hard worker and true academic. A colleague described him as "an amazing teacher, whose knowledge, experience, drive, passion and mentorship are a unique and compelling combination" with a "worldwide reputation and enormous impact as a teacher, researcher, administrator and leader."

His sister, Gilda, and his friends described him as a very generous man, always smiling and ensuring everyone felt welcome and comfortable. He and Gilda, a retired teacher from the Brooks area, established the Valli Family Scholarship Fund at the CFSEA in 2002, with the intention to help others gain an education and open themselves to possibilities otherwise unavailable.

He loved to teach and to write, creating a transformative classification system for animal lymphomas that is still in use today. His graduate students described him as "a topnotch mentor, always generous with his time and enthusiastic for everything science, medicine and pathology". Another student said, "Ted was funny, practical and brilliant - a wicked combination for an educator."

In 2017, the American College of Veterinary Pathologists (ACVP) bestowed its highest honour - Distinguished Member - on Ted for his contributions and exemplary manner to veterinary pathology. By then, he had retired to Visalia, California where he kept busy spending time with his family, restoring cars, reading, sailing, and listening to jazz. His family and friends remember him as a man who "loved life and people and will be dearly missed." Our condolences to Ted's family, friends, and all who knew him.


Thanks to Ted and Gilda's generosity, the Valli legacy will continue to help those pursuing the academic path for years to come.


DONOR MARG SIHVON INDUCTED INTO SASKATCHEWAN SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Join us as we congratulate CFSEA supporter Marg Sihvon, who was recently inducted into the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame (basketball)!

Marg began her basketball career in Moose Jaw, SK, then played for the University of Saskatchewan. Among the many highlights of her basketball career, Marg competed for Saskatchewan at the inaugural Canada Winter Games in 1967 and again in 1971 and 1975. She also played on the Canadian National Team from 1966-1972 and competed in the Pan Am Games in Columbia and World Basketball Championships in Brazil.

Marg would go on to teach and coach in Swift Current, where her high school teams won four provincial championships. She also spent five years as coach of the women's basketball team at Medicine Hat College, winning Bronze medals at the

2019 FALL GRANT EVENTS

2019 Fall Grants Events were held in four communities across our Southeast region.

\$232,638 distributed! Including: \$75,190 Smart & Caring Grants; \$60,000 RBC Future Launch Community Challenge Grants

Smart & Caring grants are awarded to charitable applicants that reflect their community's most pressing needs through our bi-annual granting process. CFSEA and our three rural Community Funds were also selected as RBC Future Launch Community Challenge sites. In partnership with Community Foundations Canada, the RBC Future Launch Community Challenge is a call to action for youth and an opportunity to bring young leaders to the decision-making table as we build strong and vibrant communities for the future.

Each were provided with \$15,000 to fund youth-led projects that will respond to one central question:

What is your boldest idea to respond to an urgent local need?

An additional \$12,000 has been generously provided by RBC Foundation to host Youth Vital Conversations in each site in February 2020. Stay tuned for more information on this event.

Please see below for photos and a list of grant recipients from all four of our events. Our rural communities have also now reached their initial \$10,000 goal for donations - congratulations! This \$10,000 was matched by CFSEA for a total of \$20,000 in each fund in less than a year. The investment income will continue to build these vibrant, healthy, caring communities long into the future.


