DONOR STORY: JACK & CAROL SNEDDEN

Jack and Carol Snedden have been supporting the Community Foundation since they established the Jack and Carol Family Fund in 2005 to benefit the community's greatest needs.

Jack was born in Rosetown, Saskatchewan and Carol was born in Lethbridge, Alberta. Both Carol and Jack graduated from the University of Alberta in May 1956. They then moved to Medicine Hat and were married on September 1st, 1956. Carol graduated in Home Economics and was employed in a different occupation at the Suffield Research Station. Jack had a long lasting career of Dentistry in Medicine Hat from 1956 to 1999.

Jack and Carol were blessed with four girls and six grandchildren, all very successful in their own fields. Jack has always been an active member in the community by volunteering on many Boards, such as Medicine Hat Dental Society, Alberta Dental Society, Alberta Educational Communications Corporation, Medicine Hat Musical Theatre, Medicine Hat College, Medicine Hat Curling Club, and many others. Carol and Jack were both active on the Board of the Fifth Avenue United Church and Jack is presently active in the Rotary Club of Medicine Hat.

Jack and Carol continue to support the Community Foundation where their donations stay in Medicine Hat to support many local organizations year after year.

FAMILY FUND HIGHLIGHT

NIWA FAMILY FUND

The Niwa family has been monumental supporters of the Community Foundation for four generations. It all began in 2001 when Marie Niwa donated a truck in memory of her husband, Dennis. The family then established the Niwa Family Fund, a donor advised fund to support a charity of their choice year after year. Gregory J Niwa was the recent Chair of the CFSEA Endowment Development committee and sat on the Board of Directors. Greg's daughter Lindsay also volunteers with the Community Foundation as a Grant committee member.

Tragically, Greg's son, Brandon, passed away suddenly in May 2020. If you know the Niwa family, you would not be surprised to hear how they are turning tragedy into action for mental health in Medicine Hat and surrounding communities. In November, the family gifted \$100,000 to the Medicine Hat College for the **Beej Project**, in support of mental health education and research. The project will implement foundational work with youth to help manage their mental health before crisis emerges. The funds will be available to a working group of education administrators including officials from the Medicine Hat College, the Medicine Hat Police Service and three local school divisions - Prairie Rose, Medicine Hat Catholic and the Public School Division.


BROOKS AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY FUND
