In 1997, the Alex and Jean McDougald Fund was established at the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta. Alex's philanthropic journey guided him to launch two of his initial legacy projects in support of the Maple Creek Skating Rink and the SW Saskatchewan Oldtimers' Museum in the early 2000's. Alex was driven by physical fitness and was an active and dedicated member of the Medicine Hat YMCA for over 20 years. He enjoyed volunteering for the Special Olympics as a swim coach and was a serious cyclist with many years of tours covering thousands of kilometers. Alex passed away in 2010 which inspired Jean to establish the Alex McDougald Memorial Fund which annually contributes to the Smart and Caring Community Fund, supporting charities across the region.

### Highlight: Rotary Music Festival

The Rotary Music Festival is a local music festival led by the Rotary Club of Medicine Hat. The two-week festival features approximately 1,000 young musicians through performances, competitions, and concerts to promote a greater appreciation for music and the arts within the community.

The The Rotary Club of Medicine Hat Music Festival Fund was established in March 2002, and since then, \$46,085 has been distributed to the Rotary Music Festival. Since the creation of the fund, it has continued to steadily grow, offering a consistent annual source of funding for the events and various awards given at the festival.







### **FALL IMPACT STORIES**

Junior Achievement (JA) Southern Alberta received a \$7,700 Fall Smart and Caring Community Grant to support the development of students' financial literacy skills, encourage their entrepreneurial spirit, and become work ready. Despite an unpredictable school year, JA Southern Alberta adapted their programs to allow educators to choose a method that was best for their unique class whether it be virtual, teacher-led, or independent learning. With this funding, 2,079 students throughout 20 schools in Medicine Hat and Southern Alberta, had the opportunity to learn and develop financial literacy skills.



"While the pandemic has affected every one of us, young adults are among those especially impacted. Research reveals young people are more at risk of long-term effects from chronic stress and trauma than adults. There has never been a more important time to understand resilience and how it equips young people to meet the challenges they face now and in the future. Through the incredible support of the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta, we were able to offer financial literacy education to over 2,000 southeastern Alberta youth. Together, we are inspiring, preparing and empowering young people to create their own economic success over their lifetime, and giving them the confidence to pursue their dreams."

The Brooks & District Child Development Society was awarded \$10,000 for their Toy Library through the Fall 2020 Smart and Caring Community Grant. The funding supported the installation of new vinyl flooring which replaced the 20+ year

### SPRING IMPACT STORIES

The Oyen Crossroads Museum received a \$3,500 Spring 2021 Smart and Caring Community Grant to purchase window coverings which allowed natural light in while keeping damaging ultraviolet rays out. With artifacts stretching beyond a century in age, avoiding further damage was a necessity.

Most of the window coverings have now been installed, replacing bare windows or curtains that were several decades old. Included in this, is the windows of the Ukranian Catholic Church, which was moved onto the museum site in 2015.

In Spring 2021, the Foremost Agricultural Society was awarded a \$10,000 Smart and Caring Community Grant to help purchase a tractor for their current outdoor area facilities and future indoor facility. The tractor has provided great value supporting multiple events at the Foremost Agricultural Society.

### **Emergency Funding**

To address the immediate and urgent needs that arose throughout the region during the pandemic, CFSEA pivoted regular granting activities and implemented additional, emergency funding opportunities, such as the Spring Repurposing Grant in early 2020 and the COVID-19 Response Fund for SE Alberta.

### COVID - 19 Response Fund for SE Alberta - \$291,712

As the pandemic continued, the CFSEA's Board of Directors established the COVID-19 Response Fund for SE Alberta. This fund provided additional supports addressing medium to long-term needs across the region. This fund was supported by the City of Medicine Hat, Government of Alberta's Matching Donation Program, and proceeds from the Stay-at-Home Gala.

#### The Medicine Hat & District Health Foundation

The Medicine Hat & District Health Foundation received \$10,000 from the COVID-19 Response Fund to initiate their Newspaper Program. Since July 2020, all inpatients at the Medicine Hat Regional Hospital have been offered a Medicine Hat Newspaper each morning. The Health Foundation Board witnessed the success of this program and continued the program with Health Foundation funds long after the grant was spent.

## FCSS Meals on Wheels Program

In 2020, the Forty Mile Regional FCSS Meals on Wheels Program received a \$15,000 grant. This grant was a catalyst to bring the Meals on Wheels program to life in the rural area of Forty Mile. This new program provided hot meals to many residents throughout the County of Forty Mile, reaching remote areas. The rural community experienced the need for food security and proper community supports.

"I told my husband I wasn't sure what he was going to eat tonight. I was too sick to cook, and he would have just eaten a peanut butter sandwich (like so many other times). #### **Hanna Volunteer Association**

The Hanna Volunteer Association, in partnership with Hanna Learning Centre, received \$8,800 through the COVID-19 Response Fund for Southeast Alberta to purchase the necessary PPE and train personnel to better serve community members. This organization was able to help citizens navigate the available information and resources during the pandemic. By being readily available and willing to help, Hanna Volunteer Association quickly became the 'go to place' in the community to link those in need with the appropriate services.

### Volunteer Program

Funding from FCSS Association of Alberta enabled the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta to hire a Volunteer Coordinator for Vulnerable Populations. Through this project, CFSEA developed two programs and a resource door-hanger which helped build connection and fight isolation during five months of the pandemic (July – November 2020).











**KEEP IN TOUCH PROGRAM** 

The Keep in Touch (KIT) Program was developed to connect a volunteer with an individual who may be feeling lonely or isolated, during a time when social connection was limited. The volunteer made regular phone calls to the participant to offer support, encouragement, and a listening ear.

After great success in the five-month pilot project, the KIT Program was adopted by Canadian Mental Health Association ASER. With a grant from CFSEA's COVID-19 Response Fund, the KIT Program will continue for an additional year.

#### **PENPAL PROJECT**

The Penpal Project, previously run by the City of Medicine Hat's Resource Worker, connected seniors and youth together during a time of uncertainty and isolation through writing weekly letters. In total, 70 pen pals participated in the project. After seven months of writing and receiving letters, the pairs had built intergenerational friendship and had an opportunity to meet in person in spring 2021.



### **DOOR HANGERS**

CFSEA's Volunteer Program partnered with JustServe.org to promote volunteer opportunities in Medicine Hat. A door hanger was created and printed, thanks to Boylan Imaging. This door-hanger was developed to help coordinate volunteer opportunities in Medicine Hat. It listed organizations with current volunteer opportunities, basic needs, and emergency resources phone numbers. The door hangers were delivered to approximately 24,000 households in Medicine Hat, thanks to the help of 346 volunteers.

### Youth in Philanthropy (YiP)

Each year, dozens of students participate in this innovative program designed to engage local youth in the world of philanthropy. YiP provides hands-on experience for students to work as a team and learn about the granting and giving process to help their community thrive.

This year, 11 groups participated helping CFSEA distribute \$19,800 to 15 unique charities:

### Scholarship

### **Chief Gordon Earl Leadership Legacy Fund**

The Chief Gordon Earl Leadership Legacy Fund is a scholarship created to recognize Grade 6 students that demonstrate qualities of leadership and good citizenship. The Legacy Fund was established in 2008 to celebrate Chief Gordon Earl's contributions to the community and honour his memory. Since its creation, 187 students have been recognized, with 22 students receiving the award in 2021. The fund is administered through the Community Foundation of Southeastern Alberta and sponsored by the Medicine Hat Safe Community Association and Medicine Hat Police Service (MHPS).

"Chief Gord Earl was an active member of the community and understood that leaders had to be developed. He recognized that Grade 6 represented a special time in a young person's development; a time when character is formed and skills and aptitudes could be nurtured. ### **Community Impact Award**

The Community Impact Award is a grant awarded to agencies that have innovative project ideas, demonstrate creativity and leadership, and support vibrant, healthy, and caring communities. In 2021, two \$25,000 grants were awarded to the Cypress View Foundation in partnership with Bike Medicine Hat and Our Collective Journey.

### CYPRESS VIEW FOUNDATION IN PARTNERSHIP WITH BIKE MEDICINE HAT

Bike Medicine Hat is an organization aimed at creating a community where cyclists of all ages and abilities can cycle safely, efficiently, and comfortably to their destination. Bike Medicine Hat has established a chapter of Cycling Without Age which provides seniors or those with mobility challenges the opportunity to go for rides on a specially designed trishaw bike operated by a volunteer pilot.

"We knew that Cycling Without Age is a wonderful program and that there had been a few different people inquire about bringing it to Medicine Hat, but the upfront costs made it a challenge. With funding from CFSEA, we were able to order 2 bikes and all necessary materials to begin operating in spring 2022. 
