

Over \$19,000 awarded in Smart & Caring Community Grants in 2021

In total, \$19,447.50 was awarded through the Smart & Caring Community Grants in 2021 in the County of Forty Mile.

Foremost Ag Society received a \$10,000 Smart & Caring Grant in the Spring of 2021, with part of the funding received from the Bishop Family Fund. This fund was established for agricultural projects for the region, and this grant was the first of its kind received in the Forty Mile area.

"Thanks for helping us purchase a tractor! Having a

tractor allows our riding arena to be used more because the ground is always groomed and in great condition for the community to use," commented Michelle Cowie, committee representative for the Foremost Ag Society.

A \$2,400 Spring Smart & Caring
Grant was also awarded to the 40
Mile Park Foundation to complete
the new park at Forty Mile Park.
This grant was also the first grant
awarded using a portion of the
investment income directly from
the Rural Community Fund of Forty
Mile.

Most recently, in the Fall of 2021, a Smart & Caring Grant was also awarded to the Friends of Bow Island Library Society for the Children's Festival project.

"This funding from the Smart & Caring Grant gives us greater confidence that we'll be able to hold the Bow Island Children's Festival for 2022 and years to come. The pandemic has taken so much away from our children and our festival will bring back some positivity, excitement, and community engagement for them to look forward to," stated Kim Mitchell, Treasurer for the Friends of Bow Island Library Society.

For the Spring 2022 grant cycle, applications open in early
February and close March 15 at
4:30 PM. There will be a Grant
Writing Workshop in early

In our first year participating in YiP (Youth in Philanthropy), \$5,400 was distributed from projects in the County of Forty Mile!

YIP PROVIDES YOUTH IN THE FORTY MILE REGION WITH THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME INVOLVED IN PHILANTHROPY AT A YOUNG AGE, AND TO SEE HOW THEY CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

Students from St. Michael's School helped distribute \$900 to HALO Air Ambulance, and another \$900 grant was given to the Medicine Hat Women's Shelter.

The students recognized how vital these services are to our region, and wanted to ensure they each received funding. They selected HALO since it provides such a critical service to everyone in the region. The Women's Shelter summer program was also selected as the students wanted to provide children in need with something to take them away from the challenges they face in their everyday home life.

The students from Senator Gershaw School granted \$1,800 to the Kale Porteous Memorial Splash Park.

While the students reviewed a number of charitable needs in the region, they felt that supporting the splash park would ensure health, wellness and recreational needs of everyone in the region could be supported, for many years, while also being able to honor the memory of their classmate.

The Fund Coordinator will be responsible for implementing and evaluating events and activities outlined in the Endowment Development Plan with the goal of building a sustainable local rural fund in the County of Forty Mile.
