COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD

The Community Impact Award is one \$30,000 grant, designed for agencies with innovative project ideas that show creativity and leadership in supporting a vibrant, healthy, and caring community.

Saamis Immigration Services Association received this award for their innovative project, "Circles of Care." This pilot project will formally mobilize and coordinate volunteers, services, neighborhoods and businesses who want to wrap their arms around vulnerable populations in specific areas. The project will initially focus on the settlement of displaced Ukrainians. Those results will be used to secure future funding for other vulnerable populations.

VITAL SIGNS

Vital Conversations took place on June 21st. 80 community members attended the event to discuss nine topics about the social and economic trends impacting local quality of life. The conversations will be combined with survey data and complied in a report later this year. This report back to the community will identify local priorities and determine CFSEA's granting priorities for the coming year.



According to The Giving Report, published by Canada Helps, "giving participation rates continue to steadily decline across all age groups."

The chart below demonstrates that overall giving rates have declined 6% between 2006 and 2019. It is common that the younger generation, with new careers and steep housing prices, gives less. However, the noteworthy data point here is among Generation X and above, as the most marked decline in giving participation rates.





"I think young people can be perceived as entitled, but that's so far from the truth. They are super passionate about causes that matter to them, particularly when it comes to social justice, inequality, and environmental issues.
