2022 FALL COMMUNITY GRANTS

Community Grants support communities across Southeastern Alberta.

Donors can choose this fund as a way to allocate their contributions to support the community's greatest needs. A comprehensive procedure to determine the most crucial community needs are gathered through annual Vital Events. Grants are then awarded based on potential impact and fund availability. These grants are awarded twice a year, in the spring and fall.

The Community Services Recovery Fund is a one-time investment of \$400 million that will help charities, non-profits, and Indigenous Governing Bodies to acquire the tools they need to adapt and modernize so they can better support pandemic recovery in communities across Canada.

January 6: Official Launch

The application portal will officially open, and applicants can submit applications.

QUEEN ELIZABETH II'S PLATINUM JUBILEE MEDAL

This year the CFSEA was selected by the Government of Alberta to award five Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee Medals to community members in Southeastern Alberta. The medals are to honour the outstanding service of many Albertans who have dedicated themselves to the service of family, community and country, just like the Queen.

The commemorative medal was created this year to mark the 70th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the throne as Queen of Canada. This Jubilee year will see 7,000 Medals awarded to worthy recipients from across Alberta.

To be eligible for a medal the person must:

- be a Canadian citizen or has permanent resident status in Canada
- have been alive on Feb. 6, 2022, and
- have made a significant contribution to Canada or a particular region of Alberta, community or field.






According to the Canadian Knowledge Hub for Giving and Volunteering, "Donors are most likely to donate because they personally believe in the cause of the organization and out of a sense of compassion for those in need."

According to a General Social Survey done by the **Canadian Knowledge Hub for Giving and Volunteering**, on Giving, Volunteering, and Participating, just over two-thirds of Canadians (68%) donated to a charitable or nonprofit organization during the one year period prior to the survey.





Nationally, roughly seven in every ten donors donate in order to make a contribution to their community or because they are personally affected by the cause or know someone else who is. About half donate because they have been asked by someone they know and just under a third because of their religious and/or spiritual beliefs. They are least likely to donate because they will receive tax credit for donating.
