Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) as many know is one-to-one traditional community mentoring. This mentoring is done anywhere in the community including libraries, movies, sporting events and so much more.

Big Brothers Big Sisters provides one on one in-school mentoring where the mentor will visit the youth during school hours to support and encourage them every week. They may work on some schoolwork, play a game, or enjoy any activity on school grounds. Teen mentoring is done in partnership with high school students who walk over to a close elementary school and spend an hour doing an activity while supervised by a mentoring coordinator. The largest growth in the district and area would be their group programming. Currently, they are working in partnership with local school divisions to promote health and wellness, and social skills. These groups can be accessed by students in grades 4-7.

BROOKS & DISTRICT COMMUNITY FUND

Serving the City of Brooks and the County of Newell

The Newell Safe Communities and the Brooks and District Child Development Society were two (2) of five (5) groups who received funds from the CFSEA Spring Community Grants. Newell Safe Communities received \$5,000 for their "Youth Police Academy", and the Brooks and District Child Development Society will utilize their \$5,000 grant for "Educational Toys". In total, Brooks and District received \$25,500 in funding.

RURAL COMMUNITY FUND OF FORTY MILE

Serving the communities within the County of Forty Mile

The Foremost Agricultural Society received a \$4,000 grant for their "Agricultural Society Groomer Project". The Bow Island and District Tourism and Historical Society received a \$3,315 grant for "Building Improvements and Upgrades" to fix the back steps of the Blues at the Bow. 40 Mile Christian Education Society was the third recipient in the Forty Mile Region, receiving \$1,899 towards their "Jump Start" Program to purchase an AED machine. In total, the Rural Community of Forty Mile received \$9,214 in Community Grants this Spring.

2023 COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD

The Brooks Farmers' Market

The Community Impact Award is a **\$25,000** grant awarded to one agency that has an innovative project idea that demonstrates creativity and leadership, and supports vibrant, healthy, and caring communities.

This year, the Community Impact Award was awarded to the **Brooks Farmers' Market** on June 1st, at the Brooks and District Community Fund Grant Event for their *Farmers' Market Money*.

The Brooks Farmers' Market is equipped to address food insecurity in the community while strengthening local farms and bringing the community together. *Farmers' Market Food Money* vouchers will be provided where a need for financial assistance for food is identified through partner organizations working with vulnerable populations in the community.

Each year, students in school and group leadership classes participate in this program which engages youth in the world of philanthropy by learning about local community issues and the charities that meet those needs.

This year the participating schools were: Crescent Heights High, Medicine Hat High, Brooks—St. Luke's Outreach, Cherry Coulee Christian Academy, St. Michael's (Bow Island), Senator Gershaw. and River Heights School These groups helped distribute \$10,590 to local charities.

2023 SPRING GRANTS

Community Grants support communities across Southeastern Alberta.

Donors can choose this fund as a way to allocate their contributions to support the community's greatest needs. A comprehensive procedure to determine the most crucial community needs are gathered through annual Vital Events. Grants are then awarded based on potential impact and fund availability. These grants are awarded twice a year, in the spring and fall.


